



UK Timber Market




2020 UK Timber Consumption (Thousand m³)*

UK Timber Market


2020 Timber Sources (Thousand m³)*

Central Point of Expertise on Timber (CPET)





UK Government's Central Point of Expertise on Timber

Advised Government departments and their suppliers on how to meet the UK Government's Timber Procurement Policy (UK TPP).

Category A evidence (independent forest certification schemes)

- Programme for the Endorsement of Forest Certification (PEFC)
- Forest Stewardship Council (FSC)

Category B evidence (all other forms of evidence)

- UK Forestry Standard source (e.g. Grown in Britain (GiB) certified)
- Forest Law Enforcement Governance and Trade (FLEGT) licenced
- Compliance with the 'Framework for evaluating category B evidence'





Government Timber Procurement Policy

The UK Government's Timber Procurement Policy (TPP) states that:

- Only timber and wood-derived products originating from an independently verifiable Legal and Sustainable source (which can include from a FLEGT partner) will be demanded for use on the government estate;
- Appropriate documentation will be required to prove it;
- Applies to all virgin timber and wood-derived products used on the government estate, including temporary site works and material supplied by suppliers.

UK Timber Regulation

'The Timber and Timber Products (Placing on the Market) Regulations 2013' based on EUTR

Defines two types of organisation:

- Operator (e.g. Timber Importer)
- Trader (e.g. Contractor)

These Regulations make provision for a purpose mentioned in section 2(2) of the European Communities Act 1972 and it appears to the Secretary of State that it is expedient for any reference in these Regulations to Regulation (EU) No 995/2010 of the European Parliament and of the Council laying down the obligations of operators who place timber and timber products on the market(d) to be construed as a reference to that instrument as the Annex to it is amended from

Specifying Timber





Inclusive Specification Clauses

An inclusive sustainable timber specification clause should include:

- Reference to timber and other wood based products
- Definition of the scope, e.g. temporary and permanent works
- Reference to the UK Government's Central Point of Expertise on Timber (CPET) definition of legal and sustainable
- Requirement for Chain of Custody to the site of use
- Examples of schemes that meet the above criteria





Example Specification Clause


The following is an example of an inclusive specification clause:

"All timber and wood based products for either temporary or permanent inclusion in the works must be from legal and sustainable sources, as defined by the UK Government Central Point of Expertise on Timber (CPET), and be delivered to site with full chain of custody. Chain of custody certification schemes recognised as meeting the above include:

- Programme for the Endorsement of Forest Certification (PEFC);
- Forest Stewardship Council (FSC); and
- Grown in Britain (GiB)."



What is Chain of Custody

Chain of Custody is defined as:

"Chain of Custody certification is a mechanism for tracking certified material from the forest to the final product to ensure that the wood, wood fibre or non-wood forest material contained in the product or product line can be traced back to certified forests."



Chain of Custody Certificate

- Correct supplier name
- Correct head office address
- Correct scope
- Products supplied listed
- Certificate number
- Start date and expiry date within project dates
- Where supplier has more than one depot, ensure Appendix lists all sites




Chain of Custody Certificate Website Check

- Search by supplier name and/or certificate number
- Find depot and click on 'More info'
- Confirm depot address
- Certificate number
- Validity and expiry date


Materials Delivery





Delivery Note Information

- Supplied from the supplier and depot on the certificate
- Correct delivery address (site <u>not</u> customer's office!)
- Delivery date within validity
- Correct product description and valid product claim
- Chain of Custody Certificate number
- Quantity (that can be used to calculate total m³)

Project Certification



Project Certification Requirements

PEFC Project Certification

- No minimum percentage of PEFC material required
- Due diligence system required for all 'Other non-certified material'
- Partial certification can be used for specific components
- Allows use of PEFC trademark
- Issues a final certificate

FSC Project Certification

- Full certification requires minimum of 50% FSC certified material
- Remainder to be 'FSC Controlled Wood' or 'Other reclaimed'
- Partial certification can be used for specific components
- Allows use of FSC trademark
- Issues a final certificate

Note: The due diligence requirements for the two schemes vary considerably
